	<i>A presentation on the results of the recent 3-year Kings Seat Hillfort project, run in partnership with P&K Heritage Trust and delivered with AOC Archaeology. The talk will cover an introduction to the hillfort, detail on the results of the fieldwork and post-excavation observations, over 3-seasons of excavations. We will explore how this important historic site has brought a group of community volunteers together to work with professionals to explore local heritage.</i>

13.45 – 14.10 Elena Koumbouzi Forth and Clyde Canal Society
Elena will introduce us to CanalCraft, a local heritage Community Project based around the Forth & Clyde Canal, connecting the inland waterway with marginalised community groups in and around Glasgow. This includes developing skills in boatbuilding, navigation, communication and learning about the heritage of canals, including recording and expressing their own understanding, stories and knowledge of the canal and their effect on the local area.

Cammo Estate: The story around how volunteers and local residents have led the unearthing of the story of this interesting and unusual local estate through archaeological excavation, training and sharing their discoveries and experiences with the community and visitors during open weekends.

A collective of local groups, schools and individuals undertook WW1 memorial projects across P&K during the recent memorialisation period. This included research on many thousands of local soldiers who died in the war, the impact of the war at home, the creation of memorial trails, concerts and other creative projects. A member of the collective will explain their projects, which for most, was their first involvement in historical research.
